Ontario's forests are vast and provide many economic, social, and environmental benefits. Covering nearly two-thirds of the province, forests are important to wildlife habitat, biodiversity, clean air and water, cultural enrichment, recreation and education services.

Through sustainable management, forests also provide a source of wood that captures carbon, and supports a sector that creates family-supporting jobs in Northern Indigenous communities and rural towns that need them. Many companies that operate today have been around for generations and want to be around for many more.

Did you know that equipment operators, truck drivers, mill workers and tree planters represent the majority of forestry sector jobs and form the largest group within the sector?

These jobs represent a critical source of employment in communities that often have few other industries.





Here are five reasons to work in the forest sector:


1 Protect forests for future generations
